Our admissions process is part of the Local Authority co-ordinated scheme. Applicants must apply to their home Local Authority by the closing date.

The St John's & St Peter's CE Academy admission number is 30. Where the number of applications is lower than the Academy's admission number, all applicants will be admitted. If there are more applications than places available, then all applications received by the Local Authority's designated closing date for receipt of applications will be considered, together and at one time, by a committee of the Governing Board's Admissions Committee.

How to apply for Reception Class

An application must be made online at www.birmingham.gov.uk/schooladmissions or by using the local authority preference form. You will also be required to complete a Supplementary Information Form for this school, which is available from the school or the local authority. **Both forms must be completed for your application to be considered.**

Oversubscription criteria

If the number of applications for a particular year group exceeds the number of places available, each application will be given a priority and places will be allocated in the following order:

Priority 1

Children looked after by a Local Authority (in accordance with section 22 of the Children Act 1989) at the time of making an application to the school and children who were previously looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted or became subject to a Child Arrangements Order or Special Guardianship Order immediately following having been looked after. From September 2021, this includes those children who appear to the admission authority to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.

Priority 2

Children with siblings at St John's & St Peter's CE Academy at time of entry.

Priority 3

Children whose parent(s) regularly attend a Christian/C of E denomination Church. We define regular as meaning at least once a month for the twelve-month period prior to application and this will be confirmed by the relevant minister completing the relevant part of the School's Supplementary Information Form.*

- a. Children of parents with a verified Church of England commitment.
- b. Children of parents with a verified commitment to a church recognised by Churches Together in England.

Priority 4

Children who live nearest to the school.

*In each case of a faith claim, the minister of the church concerned must verify there has been regular church attendance (attending at least once a month at worship for at least the preceding year). If offering places within any one of the priorities would cause the school's admission number to be exceeded then children living nearest to the school (as measured by the local authority) will be offered places first.

In the event that during the period specified for attendance at worship the church has been closed for public worship and has not provided alternative premises for that worship, the requirements of these [admissions] arrangements in relation to attendance will only apply to the period when the church or alternative premises have been available for public worship



Notes:

1. Children with an EHC Plan that names St John's & St Peter's CE Academy will be offered a place first. This may reduce the number of places available.
2. Under priority 2, siblings (brothers or sisters) are considered to be those children who live at the same address and:
 - i. have one or both natural parents in common; or
 - ii. are related by a parent's marriage; or
 - iii. are adopted or fostered by a common parent.
 - Unrelated children living at the same address, whose parents are living as partners, are also considered to be siblings.
 - Children not adopted or fostered or related by a parents' marriage or with one natural parent in common, who are brought together as a family by a same sex civil partnership and who are living at the same address, are also considered to be siblings.
 - Children who attend either a linked infant or junior school and will still be in attendance at the time of admission are considered as sibling claims. Separate boys' and girls' schools are not considered to be linked for the purposes of sibling claims.
 - All siblings must still be attending the preferred school at the time that admission is sought. For example, for the September 2021 intake the sibling must still be attending in September 2021. Therefore; for entry into Reception Class children attending nursery class or attending Year 6 are not classed as meeting the sibling criteria. For Secondary Transfers children in Year 11 and Sixth Form are not classed as meeting the sibling criteria.
3. For the purposes of education law, the Department for Education considers a 'parent' to include:
 - all biological parents, whether they are married or not;
 - any person who, although not a biological parent, has parental responsibility for a child or young person - this could be an adoptive parent, a step-parent, guardian or other relative;
 - any person who, although not a biological parent and not having parental responsibility, has care of a child or young person. A person typically has care of a child or young person if they are the person with whom the child lives, either full or part time and who looks after the child, irrespective of what their biological or legal relationship is with the child.
4. The home address is the place where the child is permanently resident with his or her parent(s). If care is shared between two parents, parents will need to provide a copy of the court order defining the arrangement. In the absence of a court order, we will use the address of the parent who is in receipt of the child benefit. Parents will need to send a copy of your child benefit award for the last two years.
5. If offering places within any one of the criteria would cause the Academy's admission number to be exceeded, then the governors will give priority to those children living closest to the school determined by the shortest distance. The local authority's 'distance' definition has been adopted. Distances are calculated on the basis of a straight-line measurement between the applicant's home address and the centre of the Academy. Distances are measured by the Local Authority. If two or more applicants share the same distance to the Academy and only one place is available, the applicant to whom the place will be offered will be determined by the Local Authority by random selection (unless this involves multiple births, in which case, all the siblings will be admitted).
6. Applications received after the Local Authority's designated closing date for receipt of applications will be deemed to have been made late and will be considered after applications with the same priority that were received on time.
7. **Waiting lists** are produced in strict order of priority, against the over-subscription criteria. Waiting lists are kept until the end of the autumn term in the year of admission.

8. **In-Year applications:** Applications made outside the normal admissions round should be made directly to the Academy. On receipt of an in-year application, the Academy will notify the local authority. Parents will also be required to complete the Supplementary Information Form, as above.

The Academy will notify parents of the decision in writing within 15 school days and will notify the local authority of both the application and its outcome to allow the Local Authority to keep up to date with figures on the availability of school places in their area.

9. **Appeals:** Parents who wish to appeal against a decision of the Governors to refuse their child a place in the Academy may apply in writing to the Chair of the Governing Board. Appeals will be heard by an independent Panel.

10. **Fair Access Protocol:** The Governing Board recognises its duty to participate in the Local Authority Fair Access Protocol.

11. **Admission of children below compulsory school age and deferred entry:**

10.1 A child is entitled to a full-time place at school in the September following their fourth birthday. The child's parents can defer the date their child is admitted to the Academy until later in the school year, but not beyond the point at which they reach compulsory school age and not beyond the beginning of the final term of the school year for which application was made.

10.2 Where parents wish, children may attend part-time until later in the school year but not beyond the point at which they reach compulsory school age.

10.3 Compulsory school age is the prescribed day on or following the child's fifth birthday. The prescribed days are **31 December, 31 March and 31 August**; e.g. For a child born between 01 September and 31 December, their prescribed day will be 31st December and therefore the child must be in compulsory education by the 31st December. For a child born between 01 January and 31 March, the child must be in compulsory education by 31 March. For a child born between 01 April and 31 August, the child must be in compulsory education by the beginning of the final term of the school year (unless the provisions relating to summer-born children below are applied).

11. **Admission of children outside their normal age group**

11.1 Parents may seek a place for a child outside of their normal age group in special circumstances, for instance if the child is gifted and talented or has experienced problems such as ill health. Such applications should be made in writing to the Chair of the Governing Board of the Academy setting out the reasons for the request. A decision will be made on the basis of the circumstances of each case and in the best interests of the child concerned.

11.2 Summer-born Children (those born between 01 April and 31 August)

11.2.1 Parents of a summer born child may choose not to send their child to school until the September following the child's fifth birthday, when they will apply for the child to enter Year 1. There is no guarantee that a place will be available at the Academy at this stage, as the year group may well already be full.

11.2.2 Parents of a summer born child may, *at the same time as making an application to the LA for Reception in the child's normal age group*, make a request of the school's Governing Board that the child may **reapply** to be admitted instead to the Reception Class in the September following the child's 5th birthday. The request should be made in writing to the Chair of the Governing Board of the Academy, setting out the reasons for the request. The Governing Board will make its decision on the basis of the individual circumstances of each case and in the best interests of the child concerned and will set out clearly the reasons for the decision.

If the Governing Board agrees to the parent's request, the existing application for the Reception place may be withdrawn and the parent must then make a **new** application for a place in Reception which will be considered against the normal oversubscription criteria **as part of the main admissions round the following year**, (and there is no guarantee of a

place being offered at this Academy at that stage). If the Governing Board does not agree to the parent's request, the parent must decide whether to accept any offer of a place for the normal age group, or to refuse it and make an in-year application for admission to Year 1 for the September following the child's fifth birthday (when, again, there is no guarantee of a place being available at this Academy).

11.3 A decision made by one admission authority in respect of admission of a child out of their normal age group is not binding on any other admission authority. Therefore, a child educated out of their normal age group at this Academy may not be accepted out of their normal age group when moving to a different Academy or from primary to secondary school.

11.4 Parents' statutory right of appeal against a decision to refuse admission does not apply if the child is offered a place at the school but it is not in the parent's preferred age group.
